
June-July 2016 Snapshot

- LTC received a GOMOR for sexual harassment that was permanently filed in the officer's AMHRR.
- SSG received a Field Grade Art. 15 for failure to report and making two false official statements, resulting in a reduction to E-5, forfeiture of \$1,583 in pay for two months (suspended for 120 days), and an oral reprimand.
- SSG received a Field Grade Art. 15 for falsifying documents, resulting in a reduction to E-5, forfeiture of \$1,583 in pay for two months (suspended for 180 days), and an oral reprimand.
- SSG received a Field Grade Art. 15 for being disrespectful toward a senior NCO, using provoking gestures, and disobeying a lawful order, resulting in a reduction to E-5, forfeiture of \$1,583 in pay for two months, and 45 days of extra duty.
- PFC received a Field Grade Art. 15 for a DUI on post, resulting in a reduction to E-1, forfeiture of \$783 in pay (suspended for 6 months), 45 days of extra duty and restriction, and an oral reprimand.

Did you know...

- Having an open container of alcohol in the passenger area of your vehicle, while on any roadway or shoulder of a public road (even when parked), is a violation of GA law. If you are transporting alcoholic beverages in your vehicle, secure them in the trunk, a locked glove compartment, or behind the rearmost upright seats if there is no trunk.

Court-Martial Spotlight

- On 29 June 2016, at a general court-martial convened at Fort Stewart, Georgia, SSG Norman K. McNeal, United States Army, was convicted by a military judge, pursuant to his pleas, of four specifications of aggravated sexual contact of a child, one specification of sexual assault, and six specifications of indecent acts upon a child in violation of Articles 120 and 134, UCMJ. The military judge sentenced the accused to be reduced to the grade of E-1, to forfeit all pay and allowances, to be confined for 20 years, and to be discharged from the service with a dishonorable discharge. As part of an offer to plead guilty, a pretrial agreement limited confinement to 10 years.
- On 14 July 2016, at a general court-martial convened at Fort Stewart, Georgia, SPC Cornelius D. Bailey, United States Army, was convicted by a military judge, pursuant to his pleas, of one specification of sexual assault in violation of Article 120, UCMJ. The military judge sentenced the accused to be confined for 18 months and to be discharged from the service with a dishonorable discharge. A pretrial agreement had no effect on the sentence.




Civilian Criminal Misconduct on Fort Stewart/HAAF (June-July)

- A defendant pled guilty to driving under the influence of alcohol and was sentenced to 72 hours of confinement, 12 months of federal probation, 30 days of community service, a \$600 fine.
- Two defendants pled guilty to driving on suspended licenses. Both were sentenced to 10 days of confinement.
- A defendant pled guilty to simple possession of marijuana and was sentenced to a \$1,000 fine, 12 months of federal probation. Mandatory substance abuse treatment was included as a condition of probation.
- Three defendants pled guilty to simple possession of marijuana. As all had no prior criminal history, they were placed on 12 months of federal probation and ordered to pay a \$1,000 fine. Upon successful completion of probation, the charges will be dismissed.
- A defendant pled guilty to possession of a drug-related object (a pipe used to smoke marijuana) and was sentenced to a \$500 fine and 12 months of federal probation.

Did you know...

- It's the responsibility of the driver of a vehicle to determine whether the vehicle is properly insured and registered. If you're borrowing a car, be sure to check that you have a valid registration sticker and proof of insurance!

If I get a traffic ticket on Fort Stewart or HAAF, will I get points on my driver's license?

- *If you receive a ticket for a moving violation on post, it is a federal ticket. Once paid, or if convicted in the case of a mandatory court appearance, the DMV or equivalent entity in the state where you are licensed will be notified. It is up to your state whether points will be assessed against your license. Questions regarding driver's license points should be directed to your state DMV.*
- *Some tickets don't require a mandatory court appearance and can be paid online at www.cvb.uscourts.gov. A failure to pay (or a failure to appear when summoned) may be reported to your state's motor vehicle or driver licensing agency, which could affect your driving privileges or vehicle registration.*
