110th Trans Co defeats 4/3 Avn. in comeback

Down 13-5 halfway through the first half, the men from the 110th Transportation Company (2-0) came together to overtake the team from 4/3 Aviation (1-1) and earn themselves a hard-fought 31-28 win in Hunter Army Airfield Intramural Basketball action, Jan. 20.

"We didn't have our legs at the beginning of the game," explained Rae Roberts, 110th Trans Co.

The Aviators opened the game on fire – taking a 6-0 lead with four points from leading scorer Blake Kelley, who finished the game with 16 points.

Ditavein Brown sank a jumper for 110th Trans Co.'s first points of the game, but 4/3 Avn. answered with a pass from Coty Reams to Kelley, who buried the fast-break layup, bringing the score to 8-2.

Marqus Lawton stole the ball from a 4/3 Avn. player and sent the ball to Brown, who swished the three-pointer. Brown finished the game as co-scoring leader, with 16 points.

But again the Aviators had an answer with a three, and increased their lead to 13-5 with two free throws from Kelley.

In the first half, it seemed every time 110th Trans Co. got some momentum, the Aviators were there to squash it. Roberts nailed a field goal, but 4/3's Ryan Quantas answered with a three of his own.

It took the Aviators about seven minutes to get back in stride, when Kelley, despite being double teamed in the paint, banked in a close jump shot off the glass, and Joshua Frank sank an easy layup to tie the game at 24-24.

Roberts and Kelley traded back-to-back baskets, but Darryl Brown gave 110th Trans Co. the lead with three minutes left in the game.

After a timeout, 4/3 tied the game 28-all with a Kelley bucket down low from an in-bound pass.

But a free throw gave 110th Trans Co. a lead they wouldn't give up, and two more from Ditavein Brown sealed the deal.

"It was a hard-fought battle," Roberts said after the game. "But we fought through adversity in the first half and made it through."

WCAP Sgt. Rohbock strikes World Cup gold on bobsled farewell tour

ALEXANDRIA, Va. – Team USA bobsled pilot Sgt. Shauna Rohbock is back in the U.S. Army World Class Athlete Program for what may be her farewell tour on the World Cup circuit.

Sergeant Rohbock teamed with brakeman Valerie Fleming to win the women's gold medal Jan. 14 at the World Cup event in Igls, Austria, where the U.S. duo prevailed by .09 seconds over Germany's Anja Scheiderheinze and Christin Senkel.

Sergeant Rohbock and Fleming are competing this season in a sled designed by Ollie Brower, a former soapbox derby competitor, and Todd Hays, who won a silver medal in the four-man competition at the 2002 Olympic Games.

"He drove it last year and was doing really well until he ended up crashing and couldn't continue," Sgt. Rohbock said in reference to the sled Hays was forced to retire from because of a career-ending head injury. "This year, I really wanted to drive it because they ended up testing it against my sled and it was definitely faster."

Sergeant Rohbock drove sleds designed by NASCAR driver Geoff Bodine for eight consecutive years before making the switch for her final season.

"I told Todd all summer long that I really wanted to drive his sled, but if this is going to be my last year, obviously I want to do well," Sgt. Rohbock said. "Especially on this track here [in Igls], everything is like fine-tuning, the little things make you faster – but it's not going to be faster if I can't drive it."

Sergeant Rohbock made her competitive debut in

Hays' sled in Lake Placid, N.Y., where "it was flying and I took second in one race and crashed in the other," she said.

"I can't believe I crashed in Lake Placid," she said. "I've never had a problem in this curve. I crashed out of Turn 12. But if you asked me where would you crash at Placid? I would say [curves] 7-8 or 17-18. I would never say out of 12 – I can't believe it happened."

After winning the season-opening World Cup silver medal at Whistler, B.C., and getting cancelled by a blizzard Dec. 10 in Park City, Utah, Sgt. Rohbock and Fleming had two races in Lake Placid.

"I took second in the first race and we were probably going to end up second in the second race, but I ended up crashing," Sgt. Rohbock said. "So I would have three seconds and one first."

Sergeant Rohbock struggled with a quadriceps injury to finish eighth at Calgary, the other stop on the 2010-2011 World Cup circuit. She has three World Cup events remaining, followed by the World Championships on Feb. 18-19 in Königssee, Germany.

"The problem is my body is just so hammered right now," Sgt. Rohbock said. "After the Vancouver Olympics, I almost retired. Actually, I was pretty much retired over the summer. Valerie and I both live in Park City and we went for a walk one night and I was like, 'Let's just retire.' And she said, 'OK, good, I'm there with you. That's fine with me.'"

Sergeant Rohbock says very little would have happened with her bobsledding career without the support of WCAP and the Army National Guard Outstanding Athlete Program. She served as a forerunner at the 2002 Olympics in Park City as a member of WCAP. A forerunner is a non-competing athlete who drives

down the bobsled track prior to competitors to ensure the surface is ready.

Sergeant Rohbock was released from WCAP in 2003 because her unit was preparing to deploy. At the 2006 Olympic Games in Turin, Italy, she teamed with Fleming to win a silver medal while representing the Army National Guard. At the 2010 Vancouver Olympics, Sgt. Rohbock teamed with Michelle Rzepka and finished sixth at the Whistler Sliding Centre.

"I feel like the military programs are why you end up winning medals," Sgt. Rohbock said. "Everybody wants to support you in your Olympic year. In your offseason, that's when nobody cares. The WCAP carries you whether it's an Olympic year or non-Olympic year – they're there supporting you. At Torino, I have to say WCAP was a big part of that medal as well because without them I wouldn't have been able to be a brakeman and start my driving career and then move into this other program."

"The military programs have probably been the biggest part of my success. Without them, I don't feel like I would have been able to win any medals."

Fleming is happy just to share a sled with Sgt. Rohbock.

"I've been feeling great," said Fleming, 34. "It's been a never-ending string of injuries for Shauna over the last five to six years, which I know is frustrating for her. I always want to do better. ... I have all the confidence in the world in Shauna. Her driving ability is awesome, and she can make up time that we might be losing at the start."

Once all is said and done, Sgt. Rohbock hopes to be remembered as one of the best athletes in the history of USA Bobsledding.
