## New School Age Youth Center opens at Hunter

A crowd of approximately 100 people braved the cold and wind to attend the Child, Youth and School Services Center's ribbon-cutting ceremony for the new School Age Youth Center at Hunter Army Airfield, along with the re-signing of the Army Family Covenant for Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield, Feb. 26.

With Hunter's growing population, the center is the first of two new childcare facilities to open this year to serve the needs of Families; the second will open in June. Two additional childcare facilities are scheduled to open in 2011.

"Our childcare programs have grown as the installation has grown," said Terri McMillan, Child and Youth Service director at Hunter. "These additions are part of the Family Covenant."

This \$7 million, 20,556 square-foot facility on S. Perimeter Road features multiple amenities such as, computer rooms, atrium, multipurpose room, and more features that Families can enjoy. The facility houses children, grades one through five, for School Age Services and a middle teen program for grades six through 12.

"We design these facilities to make life better for our Families," said Brig. Gen. Jeffrey Phillips, 3rd Infantry Division, deputy commanding general-rear.

The center also provides before and

after school programs, 4-H programs, tutors, and Boys and Girls Club of America programming, according to Meckela Smith, transitions specialist, Child Youth and School Services for Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield.

The Army Family Covenant was also re-signed by military leaders, as part of the activities at the facility's grand opening.

Those in attendance watched a video of 3rd Infantry Division Commander, Maj. Gen. Tony Cucolo, who spoke of how the Family Covenant re-signing reinforced the purpose and pledge of the covenant and how he will continue to 'keep the promise' of the covenant to Family Members.

Brigadier General Phillips followed the video with comments about the relationship between Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield and the civilian community.

"There has been an incredible interwoven net of support between Hunter and the civilian community," he said.

Jordan Whitten, the 10-year-old son of a Soldier at Hunter, said he enjoyed his role in the SAYS celebration, especially cutting the ribbon.

"I was nervous, but I got through it," he said. Jordan also said he likes the new facility and has already used it after school. "It's great," he said, smiling broadly. "There is more to do here than at the old building. My favorite part is the activity and game room."

# SHUTTER ISLAND, REVIEWED

This is one of those instances where I ask myself if the critics were watching the same film as I was. "Shutter Island" has gotten its share of "A"s and "B"s, but just as many "C"s and "D"s. My advice is to ignore the critics altogether. In fact, before heading to the theatre for this one, and yes, you should definitely go see it, avoid reading any reviews altogether. You'll be glad you didn't.

The spooky thriller reprises the director/actor partnership between Martin Scorsese and Leonardo DiCaprio. Their last collaboration,

"The Departed," won best picture for 2006. Rumors abound that their next project will put DiCaprio into the role of Frank Sinatra. I chuckled when I heard this first, but after enjoying "Shutter Island" I'm convinced Leo can do practically anything.

In "Shutter Island" two US Marshalls (DiCaprio and Mark Ruffalo) delve into the seriously scary mental institution for violent offenders which sits, similarly to Alcatraz, secluded on New England isle. They're asked to surrender their firearms as



they investigate the disappearance of a female patient/inmate.

Viewers investigate the treacherous facility with DiCaprio every step of the way. They are haunted by the death of his beautiful wife (played by Michelle Williams) and plagued by the stark, creepy soundtrack, hallucinations and headaches. They are tossed about when a hurricane hits the island, and they hold their breath as they grope around in the dark with psychopathic killers waiting behind every corner. As the plot deepens and

we wonder who is pulling the strings, the list of people DiCaprio can trust thins. Will he ever leave the island?

There is one minute flaw in "Shutter Island" and that is that the biggest twist in the film can be guessed at easily. I knew what it was before the movie ever started. But my mind was still blown by the surprises in this tale. What really made me want to applaud were the style elements drawn from Hitchcock and Kubrick. "Shutter Island" is visually stunning, not unlike Tarantino's last effort "Inglorious Basterds." It's a top notch atmospheric thriller, which appropriately showcases DiCaprio's ever growing acting chops.

## Shred It – Don't Share It Days

The Directorate of Plans, Training, Mobilization, and Security in conjunction with the Directorate of Public Works sponsored the first ever Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield "Shred It – Don't Share It" Days. The driving force behind the event was protection of Personally Identifiable Information and the prevention of identity theft.

The "Shred It – Don't Share It" Days were held Feb. 22-25 that afforded community members and organizations the opportunity to bring PII and Controlled Unclassified Information to established turn-in locations for destruction.

The event was a huge success, accumulating 2,500 pounds of CUI/PII paper documents that were shredded. Due to the community support, this event is being projected again for Oct. 11-14.

Identity theft is serious. The Federal Trade Commission estimates that as many as 9 million Americans have their identities stolen each year.

Identity theft occurs when someone uses your personally identifying information, like your name, social security number, or credit card number, without your permission, to commit fraud or other crimes.

The crime takes many forms. Identity thieves may rent an apartment, obtain a credit card, or establish a telephone account in your name. You may not find out about the theft until you review your credit report or a credit card statement and notice charges you didn't make—or until you're contacted by a debt collector.

While some identity theft victims can resolve their problems quickly, others spend hundreds of dollars and many days repairing damage to their good name and credit record. Some

consumers victimized by identity theft may lose out on job opportunities, or be denied loans for education, housing or cars because of negative information on their credit reports. In rare cases, they may even be arrested for crimes they did not commit.

Protect yourself and your Family Members from identity theft. To thwart an identity thief who may pick through your trash or recycling bins to capture your personal information; always destroy your charge receipts, copies of credit applications, insurance forms, physician statements, checks and bank statements, expired charge cards that you're discarding, and credit offers you get in the mail.

Brittin Elementary School began its celebration with activities, March 2 and will continue the observance through March 11.

Because required standardized testing had to be done first, educators at Kessler and Diamond elementary schools on Fort Stewart had to schedule Read Across America events during the week of March 8-12.

Following are examples of activities and events planned, in addition to guest readings and Seuss-themed decorations, at on-post elementary schools:

- Serving healthy "Green Eggs and Ham" breakfasts, inspired by the book by Dr. Seuss, first published in 1960. As of 2001, according to Publishers Weekly, "Green Eggs and Ham" was the fourth-best-selling English-language children's book of all time.
- A "Cat in the Hat" day, a day to wear black and white, or maybe a red bow tie.
- Wacky Wednesday, when students and teachers will wear wacky clothes. Any Seuss type clothing is fine.
- Foot Book day. Wear mismatched shoes and socks.
- "Readers' Oath:" Students will commit to

reading by taking a reader's oath.

- Face Painting with Dr. Seuss book characters.
- Buddy Reading- upper grades students visiting lower grades to read with a lower grade student.
- Door decorating contests, with youngsters creating colorful decorations based on their favorite book.

Child, Youth and School Services also is joining the on-post efforts to encourage kids to read, with fun events planned on four occasions.

There will be elementary readings at the Child Development Center in building 442 on Monday and at the CDC in building 403 on March 10. Dr. Seuss Day will be celebrated on March 18 at CDC, building 475. School Age Services will promote Read Across America with books, computer games, hat making, giveaways and other fun activities from 4:30-6 p.m., March 19.

NEA's Read Across America was first celebrated on March 2, 1998, the birthday of Theodor Seuss Geisel, better known to the world as Dr. Seuss.

And the King of Pop, Michael Jackson, came alive through dance by Nathalohn Nanai, complete with white glove, hat, and moon walking.

One would think that several months of preparation would go into such a production. Not so, according to Delven Mearis, special education teacher and one of several administrators who actively worked on the event.

"The idea began in the classrooms around mid-January," said Mearis. "There were only three full rehearsals for the participating students."

Even some students who were not actual participants but knew the songs of the choir were invited to perform from their place in the audience as the song 'Peace like the River' was played.
