Stewart-Hunter to hold Bass Tournament, April 10

Rules/Regulations

- All anglers must have State of Georgia and Fort Stewart Fishing license/permits.
- Gas motors may not be used (motors may be on the boats, but must be trimmed up).
- Only electric motors (trolling motors) or paddles are allowed.
- Two anglers per boat.
- One life-vest per person must be on each boat.
- This is a catch and release tournament.
- All bass must be live at weigh-in and released after official weigh-in.
- All other bass caught during tournament must be released alive.
- No bass under the 12 inch limit may be turned in.
- This size limit is for tournament only! Creel limits will return to 15 inch minimum/5 bass per day at end of tournament!
- Dip nets will be allowed.
- No trolling.
- Electronics (depth finder, fish finders, GPS, etc) are permitted.
- Artificial lures only; No live bait or electronic lures allowed.
- Anglers must remain in boat / No wading for bank anglers.
- All bass must be caught in a sporting manner; No snatching/snagging bass off beds. Bass must be hooked inside the mouth.
- One bass per person to be weighed in.
- All participants 15 and younger must be with an adult.
- Pineview will be open to public fishing with regular creel limits after weigh-in at 11 a.m.: 15 inch minimum/5 bass per day.

Registration/Launching

- Early registration to be turned into Pass & Permit no later than April 7.
- Anglers may register at event beginning one hour before event.
- Boats may be launched before event, but must wait for horn at 7 a.m. to leave launching area/begin fishing.
- Bank fishermen will also meet in same registration/weigh-in area and will be released to fish with boat anglers.

Penalties:

- 0.5 lbs for dead fish weighed in.
- 0.5 lbs for short fish weighed in (bass must be measured by closing mouth and pressing tail together).

Undefeated Yellow Jackets beat Tigers 12-0

When an undefeated team like the Wayne County Yellow Jackets are set to play a baseball game, it's a safe bet the squad's opponent knows what it's up against. On Monday, Bradwell Institute faced the Jackets on the diamond, and although the Tigers held them down early on, Wayne County pulled out a 12-0 victory to remain undefeated.

However, the Tigers deserve some credit. Eric Wells started for BI and pitched well. The Tigers allowed one run in the first inning, thanks in part to Wells and the defense.

In the second inning, a Yellow Jacket player hit a double and was later brought in by a hit to center field falling just short of BI outfielder Zach Hawkins. The Jackets scored another run on a throwing error by the Tigers to close the inning up 3-0.

The Tigers held the Yellow Jackets until the fourth inning when their throwing errors came back to haunt them. Bradwell allowed two runs

by hits, but gave up three runs because of wild throws in the infield. Trailing 7-0 with one out, the Tigers pulled it together and closed out the inning with a double play at first and home.

In the fifth inning, the Yellow Jackets scored a run.

In the top of the sixth, Tiger Eran Hodge took the mound. The Jackets scored a run to go up 9-0. The next Yellow Jacket got on base and the following Jacket smacked a homerun over the light pole in left field to make it 11-0.

The next batter was able to steal second and third due to throwing errors. He later scored the winning run to end the game at 12-0.

The Tigers were scheduled to play in Brunswick on Tuesday and will host Beach tomorrow at 5 p.m. They are currently 2-7 overall and 0-1 in the region.

Veteran wins first US medal in Paralympic Biathlon

WHISTLER, British Columbia – U.S. Army Afghanistan veteran Andy Soule won what was not only the first U.S. medal of the 2010 Paralympic Winter Games; it was also the first-ever medal for the U.S. Paralympic Biathlon team, March 13.

After placing fifth in the morning qualification race, Soule came from behind in the final race of the men's sitting 2.4-km pursuit to win the bronze medal on the opening day of competition.

"After I passed [Sergey] Shilov, I just hammered it and didn't look back," said Soule.

"It felt just incredible. I've had World Cup wins and World Cup podiums before, but there's nothing quite like this - in this atmosphere, in front of the crowd here with everyone watching."

Soule is a retired Soldier from Pearland, Texas, who served in Operation Enduring Freedom. He was a cadet at Texas A&M during the Sept. 11, 2001 attacks that prompted him to enlist.

While on a security patrol in the Shinkay District of Afghanistan May 21, 2005, Soule was a gunner in the back of a Humvee when an improvised explosive device detonated.

The explosion killed one Soldier and damaged Soule's legs, leading to a double amputation above the knees.

Soule was evacuated to Landstuhl Regional Medical Center in Germany and then sent to Fort Sam Houston, Texas, where he spent the next several years recuperating at Brooke Army Medical Center.

During his rehabilitation, he began looking for ways to keep active.

"We had a number of opportunities (at Brook Army Medical Center) to get involved in various sports through some local organizations," said Soule.

"One of those sports we got involved with was handcycling."

While Soule was participating in a bike ride in San Antonio in 2005, he met the director of Wood River Ability Program, Mark Mast, who encouraged Soule to get involved with cross country skiing.

"Mark thought I had potential as a cross country skier," said Soule. "He runs a camp every winter for the U.S. Adaptive Cross Country Ski Team to develop new athletes and he invited me to it."

Soule had never even tried cross country skiing prior to his injury. In fact, he had very little skiing

experience.

"I had been downhill skiing a couple of times, but that was it," said Soule.

A year after attending the camp he moved to Sun Valley, Idaho to begin to train full-time at the Sun Valley Nordic Center.

He was hooked and with impressive results at the 2007 U.S. Championships and two consecutive top-10 finishes in his first World Cup races, Soule earned a spot on the U.S. Ski Team.

"It was a great race," said U.S. Biathlon Paralympic Head Coach Greg Rawlings of Soule's performance Saturday.

"He went into it with a great attitude and just started reeling people in. He missed one and went around the penalty loop, but didn't stress it. He just kept going

and cleaned it on the final. I think his brain switched right there and he figured out that he was in the game. He was able to pick people off one at a time until he was at the line."

Top-ranked Irek Zaripov of Russia won gold with a time of 9:51.00, while Ukraine's Iurii Kostyuk crossed the finish line +47.9 for silver.

Soule, who entered competition ranked fourth overall in International Paralympic Committee World Cup points, posted a final time of 10:53.01.

"Andy did an amazing job today, coming from behind in the last loop with one penalty. It was a spectacular performance and I couldn't be

more proud of him," said U.S. Biathlon Executive Director Max Cobb.

"U.S. Biathlon just got involved in the Paralympics about two and a half years ago.

"For us, this is validation of the athletes' hard work, of the coaches' work with them and the fact that the American team can win medals at the Paralympic level in biathlon."

Biathlon competition continues at Whistler Olympic Park on Wednesday with the men's sitting 12.5 km, women's sitting 10 km, men's and women's standing 12.5 km, and men's and women's visually impaired 12.5 km events.
