Fight for women's equality hard, necessary

"In the military, especially in the Army, in the most heavily used element of the nation's military power, the fact that we look upon each other as equals is an absolute critical, essential piece for success, both in peace and in war," said Maj. Gen. Tony Cucolo. "We fight side by side, male and female."

The 3rd Infantry Division's commanding general spoke to Soldiers and civilians who filled Woodruff Theater here, Aug. 26 as Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield observed Women's Equality Day.

Dr. Judy Scherer, Liberty County Board of Education Superintendent, was the main speaker at the assembly. Liberty County Public Schools teach the majority of Fort Stewart's school-age youth.

"The beginnings of the fight for women's suffrage began with the Declaration of Independence," she said.

"But equal rights for women came after a long and difficult struggle. Victory took decades of advocacy, work and effort. Many of us are less familiar with the exertion that it took for women to obtain that right to vote."

According to Scherer, the first women's rights convention was held in Seneca Falls, N. Y. in 1848. Four

years later, Susan B. Anthony joined the fight, arguing that the right to vote was the one thing that women needed above all others. During the debates of reconstruction and granting African American men rights, women worked very hard in that campaign in hopes that they too would be given the right to vote.

Unfortunately, they were not successful. In 1872, members of the women's suffrage movement brought forth a series of court challenges designed to test whether voting was a privilege of the United States citizenship, which belonged to women as well as men. These challenges grew out of a criminal prosecution of Susan B. Anthony for illegally voting in the election of 1872.

Although the fight for women's rights was hard, it was not without victory.

"The ratification of the 19th amendment to the United States Constitution, along with the 13th amendment fulfilled the commitment that was made in the Declaration of Independence that said that no person shall be deprived of equal rights under the law," Scherer said.

"Women are free today to be what they want to be. We've come a long way in this country and in this world in establishing equality for all individuals, regardless of our sex, our race, or our national origin."

Vanguards reflect on 19th Amendment anniversary

FORWARD OPERATING BASE KALSU, Iraq – Soldiers from the 4th Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division and civilians of Forward Operating Base Kalsu took time to reflect on the anniversary of the passage of the 19th Amendment, which took place 88 years ago.

The 19th Amendment gave women the right to vote. Participants celebrated its lasting impact on society during a celebration of Women's Equality Day at the FOB Kalsu dining facility Aug. 26.

Lieutenant Colonel Monica Robinson, Army Materiel Command brigade logistics support team chief, spoke to the crowd about women's equality and the importance of voting.

"The right to vote is a precondition of women's equality, because it represented the right to have an active voice in our government," Robinson said.

"Today, too many of us, men and

women alike, take that precious right to vote for granted."

Robinson also stressed that equality was something members of our society continue to seek today.

"Equality will not come in a fancy box, with a neatly-tied bow," she added.

"Equality is a work in progress. In order for full equality to be realized, it must start at the ballot box."

Prior to Robinson's speech, 1st Lt. Marcella Evans, 4th Brigade Special Troops Battalion, 3rd Inf. Div. logistics officer-in-charge, energized the crowd with a passionate performance of Sojourner Truth's "Ain't I a Woman" speech from the 1851 Ohio Women's Rights Convention.

Patrons also watched scenes from "Iron Jawed Angels," a 2004 film about women's suffrage in America in the early 1900s.

A 5K walk/run was also held in recognition of Women's Equality Day earlier that morning.

Women's Equality Day was first recognized and celebrated in the United States in 1971.

Job hunters seek employment opportunities at Fort Stewart job fair

When looking for a job, it is sometimes difficult due to small selections of employers available. But for those on Fort Stewart, the search for a job just got

a bit easier.

Family members, Department of Defense civilians, local city citizens and transitioning Soldiers came out to participate in the 26th Fort Stewart Job Fair, Aug. 27 held at Club Stewart.

The fair, sponsored by the Army

Career and Alumni Program, hosted more than 94 different industries and service providers offering employment opportunities and plans.

"The importance is having numerous employers in one location," said Louisa Sigman, the Transitions Services manager. "Job seekers can come in and talk to five, six or more job employers at a time."

The fair helped give assistance in locating jobs for people who are leaving government services and for those seeking a new job.

"So rather than going out and going to different organizations, it is kind of like a one-stop-shop," said Sigman, also the ACAP manager. "They are increasing their chance of finding employment."

After arriving at the fair, the hopeful job hunters received a packet called the "Job Seeker's Guide".

Inside the packet was a list of all the employers attending the fair and job positions opened to fill.

More than 2,500 job seekers attended the fair to speak to the multitude of potential employers from throughout the country, who were offering national and international job positions.

For Soldiers transitioning out of the military, who will be seeking jobs within the next year, it provided an opportunity to speak with potential employers to coordinate job opportunities prior to leaving the military.

"Today, I came to take advantage of the opportunities that are here," said Spc. Michael David Ponder, assigned to Company C, Warrior Transition Battalion. "I need to further my career when I transition out of the military."

Prior to the job fair, job seekers were advised to bring along an up-to-date resume to present to employers.

"It's important to be able to have something to hand out to employers," Sigman said. "They talk to hundreds of people and they don't remember just one individual."

"They have something to remember you by," she said. "And it increases the likelihood of being able to find a job." Though many of the job seekers came to see what job opportunities were out there, others came to look for a career.

"I am looking for great income and great benefits," Ponder said. "I'm looking for a large company that I can retire from."

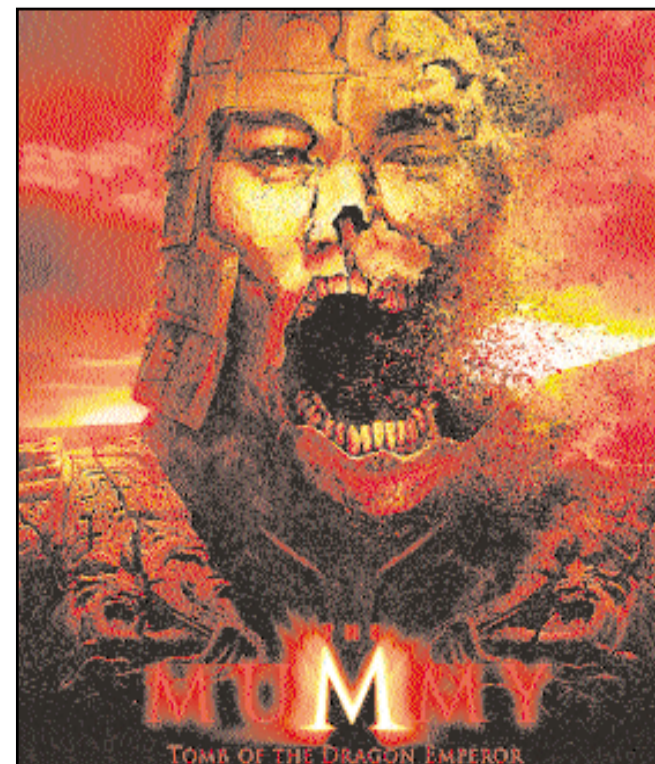

New technologies at Winn

Winn Army Community Hospital is moving ahead with a greater use of cutting-edge health care technologies with the advancement in telemedicine.

So what is telemedicine? Telemedicine is essentially the practice of medicine at a distance – enabled by technology and high-speed telecommunications networks. Telemedicine exchanges medical information from one site to another via electronic communications. Doctors use videoconferencing, transmission of still images, e-health, including patient portals and remote monitoring of vital signs all to improve patients' health status. Doctors deployed forward in Operation Iraqi Freedom and Operation Enduring Freedom have been using telemedicine technology to provide sub-specialty care to Soldiers in Iraq and Afghanistan in order to keep them in the fight and not medically evacuate them. Now this service is available at Winn to keep Soldiers and Family members at home and still receive specialty medical care not readily available in the Fort Stewart area.

Winn has been doing telemedi-

cine for two years with radiology. Just recently, Winn started doing consults with teledermatology to augment services since the dermatologist is deployed. Using a Web-based application, teledermatology improves patients' access to dermatologists and allows Winn providers to deliver the highest level of dermatological care to their patients.

"We have found that telemedicine improves access to specialty medical care and increases patient convenience," said Maj. (Dr.) Andrew Doyle, chief of Primary Care at Winn.

In the future, Winn sees Telepsych to include child psychology, to be available for patients.

While doctors say face-to-face interaction with patients is preferred, telemedicine technology may save patients time and gas money. With telemedicine, Winn provides clinical services as well as educates health care providers with continuing medical education. Telemedicine is a part of Winn's effort to improve the health of its patients.

"The use of telemedicine offers us the potential of extending the reach of a vast array of medical specialists much farther forward than anything we have ever imagined in the past," Doyle said.

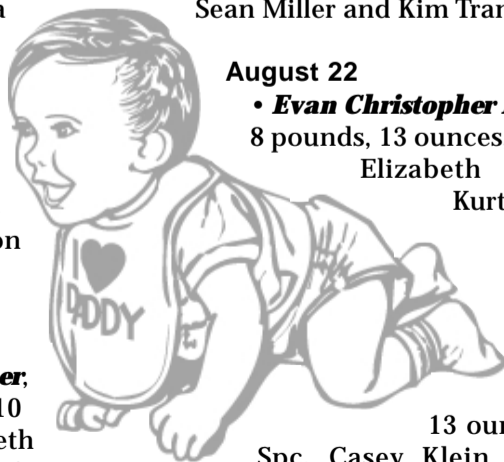

Courtesy cart drivers keep pace with care

Linda King, patient advocate, convinced volunteer Dick Webb to drive a courtesy cart at Winn Army Community Hospital, because she saw a need to transport patients to and from the hospital's parking lot.

Webb then began recruiting volunteer drivers for the hospital in January 2007.

"It is always hard to find drivers," Webb said. "But once they try out for the program, they usually stay on."

Webb has recruited drivers from all over the community, bringing with them their experience, knowledge and desire to serve the community. They are from diverse backgrounds.

"We are all retired and have empty nests; we all wanted to do something worthwhile with our time," said volunteer driver Rosemary Evans.

The military is well represented among the cart drivers.

"At one point, the drivers had a total of 317 years of military service between them," Webb said.

The courtesy cart drivers work four-hour shifts, Monday through Friday. They come to work for their physical and mental health, adding purpose to their lives, said Brigitte Shanken, Director of Volunteer Services at Winn. In less than two months Winn had several drivers working as much as three days a week, responding to King's initiative.

Enthusiasm beams from these volunteers. When they get together, they laugh and joke.

"Ninety-nine percent of the time, it is a very rewarding job," said volunteer Bruce King.

Many agree that kids are drawn to the carts, which are basically golf carts that hold seven to eight people, but some of the children are reluctant to get on and then do not want to get off.

"We benefit more than the people we serve," Webb

said.

Many of the drivers reported that they are faced with people coming out of the hospital a little disoriented and have forgotten where they have parked.

"The volunteers' patience and efforts to locate parked vehicles are greatly appreciated, as often it's the little things that make the most difference," Shanken said.

All volunteer courtesy cart drivers are recognized for their service and a statement from Lt. Col. Kevin Forrest, deputy commander for administration, Winn Army Community Hospital left no doubt.

"Volunteers are an important part of our workforce. They serve in a variety of positions, many of which are on the front line at Winn—helping our patients directly. Winn's volunteers truly exhibit selfless service and play a vital role in our efforts to improve patient satisfaction in the community," Forrest said.

West; and Charlotte Webb.

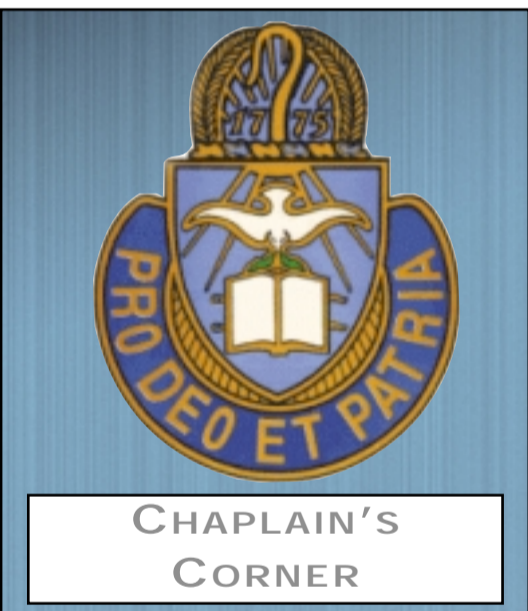
"A more dedicated, dependable, resilient and reliable team of volunteers would be hard to find," Webb said.

Where do we go when we want to find a place where we can stand on level ground with everyone else around us?

Life itself holds so many challenges in and of itself, but we often find ourselves at odds with one another simply because of where we may come from, or where we stand in wealth or poverty.

Where can we go where none of that matters, where we don't have to worry about where we come from, or how much we may or may not have in our pockets? The answer is at the feet of the Lord. *1 Samuel 16:7* states, "The

Lord does not look at the things man looks at. Man looks at the outward appearance, but the Lord looks at the heart."

story, and terrifically acted.

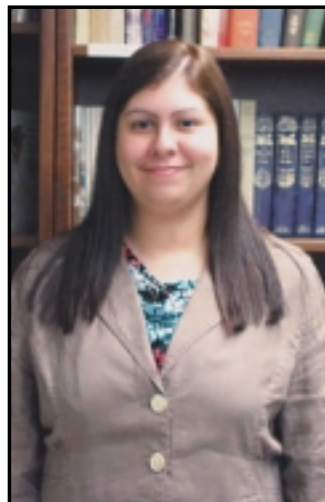
That is why it did not make my list. These others, however, have made my list of the 10 worst films.

New transit system provides hope, opportunities

A new transit system will soon make a major impact to Hinesville and will have reaching effects to Liberty County and Fort Stewart.

Planners held an open house, Aug. 28 for the new system to educate community members on proposed routes and gather input from customers, including proposed names for the system.

The new system will service portions of Liberty County, Flemington, Hinesville and Fort Stewart, providing access to shopping, medical facilities, and employment.

Among the proposed routes include stops at Memorial Hospital, downtown Hinesville, public libraries, and various locations around Fort Stewart, to include the Sgt. 1st Class Paul R. Smith Education Center and Winn Army Community Hospital.

Vicki Davis, Director of the Downtown Development Authority, said the new system would provide a vital service to the business community and makes many of the city's amenities more accessible to military and local community as a whole.

"I'm really excited at all the proposed routes which include the downtown business area," Davis said, noting that the system will act as a catalyst for several of Hinesville's construction projects like Memorial Drive and the Downtown Business Recruitment program. "It will add synergy to the community - community being defined as a place to live, work, do business and be entertained."

Hinesville Mayor Jim Thomas was at the open house and noted how the sys-

tem would strengthen the bond already shared between the military and civilian community.

"This allows a closer interaction between the Families on Fort Stewart and here in Hinesville," Thomas said. "It opens opportunities for Families and children to travel between the installation and Hinesville community."

The mayor said the project, funded in part by state and federal grants, would open up a myriad of opportunities for community members throughout the area at a relatively low cost to customers - with tokens made available on-post and off at convenient locations.

Louise Lovett, a longtime resident of Liberty County said she believes the transit system was a move in the right direction.

"I think it's a great asset to the whole community," Lovett said. "When they get the routes figured out, we'll see how we can take it farther."

Father Will Carter, Saint Phillips Episcopal Church echoed the mayor's and Lovett's thoughts on providing opportunities. He said it affords Families the opportunities for Families who want their children to attend church, but noted it did a lot more.

"It provides flexibility for a lot of people," Carter said. "It gives an added resource to single parents, spouses of deployed Soldiers. It allows those without transportation to go to work. It helps the elderly get to healthcare providers. It does so much. It opens up solutions."

Hinesville Councilman, and Mayor Pro Tem Charles Frasier said it was especially important to healthcare, but said the service itself was important, because after all, not all people have transportation.

BOSS serves up breakfast for Soldiers

Patrons of the local commissary know a good deal when they see one, and the Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield commissary system has them by the bag.

There are many sales specials, promotions and give-aways for the entire community, some of which save the average shopper about 30 percent on their grocery bill. But some of these specials benefit Soldiers specifically, as some Better Opportunities for Single Soldiers participants found out, Aug. 28 at a complimentary breakfast.

The event, held for the Soldiers at the commissary was to introduce them to better nutrition and healthier choices. The breakfast emphasized low sugar cereals and oatmeal instead of fast food, said Denise Simpson, store administrator.

Products packaged for individuals to grab and go and deli specialties are other services available to Soldiers, which offer choices that can meet the needs of single Soldiers. For instance, the grab and go features potato salad, sandwiches, fruit salads, green leafy salads and sushi.

The deli is there to serve, Simpson said. They will make a custom sandwich for an individual, and they stock specialty sandwiches, chicken wings, half and whole rotisserie chickens and the new

panini sandwich. The commissary also offers the Soldiers a designated register at the front door to help expedite their purchases. Soldiers can walk in, grab a beverage and a sandwich and be out within minutes.

Taking advantage of barracks amenities like kitchenettes, combined with services available at the commissary add to single Soldiers' quality of Life.

Don Snelsire, store director, said the commissary is a non-profit organization and can buy in mass from distributors. He said the commissary can purchase directly from distributors who often have discontinued products at reduced prices.

Thus the commissary can pass the savings on to commissary shoppers.

Snelsire said the commissary also donates many products such as non-perishable foods toward Morale, Welfare and Recreation activities and toward BOSS fund raisers.

One of those special events is the Soldier Awareness Month, held in March. During that month, the commissary holds activities specifically for single Soldiers, like a picnic at Holbrook Pond. At that event, the commissary provides prizes and gift certificates, assisted by the installation's MWR.

"The well-being of single Soldiers is what BOSS strives for," said Chris Dent, MWR BOSS Advisor.
