## Recreational diving class gains popularity

Nearly a dozen Soldiers and Family Members participated in the recreational scuba diving class at the Leisure Travel Office classroom then the pool phase of their training. The course includes classroom, pool and open water phases.

"During the classroom phase, they learn about the equipment, decompression, dive table and dive computer," said Col. (Ret.) Stefan Sherman, a double-certified scuba diving instructor. "In the confined water or pool phase, they get use to the equipment until they're confident. When they're ready,

they go down to Florida for the open water phase."

He said the open water phase is usually done in one of the clear water springs found in central Florida where the new divers can see the fish and maybe a manatee. Sherman recently retired from the Dental Activities Command then returned to work as a civilian contracted dentist. Joking that he's "older than dirt," Sherman said he's been diving since he was a teen in the early 60s. One of his most memorable Army assignments was with the Special Operations Command, which allowed him to get some additional scuba training from the Navy.

Sherman, a certified scuba instructor, conducts recreational diving class whenever he gets five or more students interested. He also conducts a scuba class for Warriors in Transition amputees. He said these Soldiers benefit not only from the therapeutic nature of scuba diving, they also improve their self-confidence by learning to do something physically demanding.

One of Sherman's current students, Garrison Command Sgt. Maj. Charles Durr, helped him get the diving classes started, especially his introduction to diving class for Soldiers in the Warrior Transition Unit.

"I'm not even a swimmer," said Durr, explaining his reasons for taking the class. "But I've been telling Soldiers, Family Members and especially our wounded Warriors about the scuba class for months. I just

decided it was time I experienced it for myself."

Another one of Sherman's students is Spc. Shawn Robey, a WTU Soldier. Originally from Charleston, S.C., Robey took the classroom phase with the recreational divers but will take his pool phase separately, today. While he was stationed in Iraq in July 2007, Robey lost the lower part of his left leg and severely injured his right foot from an improvised explosive device. Describing himself as an avid outdoorsman who always loved hunting, fishing and riding his all-terrain vehicle, Robey said he was looking for adventurous things he could still do.

"Colonel Sherman brought it to my attention," said Robey, who met Sherman by chance one day during physical therapy treatment. "I already knew swimming was good therapy, but I got interested after hearing him talk about diving, so I decided to do it. It's helped me a lot already."

Sherman supplements his classroom instruction with video lessons, which he pauses now and then to better illustrate how to understand decompression charts or explain the formula used to determine the amount of nitrogen in the body following a dive, according to the depth and length of the dive. He interacts with students one-on-one, showing them how to use the dive computer or simply answering their specific questions. In the pool, his instruction is even more personal, taking the time to show each student how to work comfortably with his or her air regulator and control his breathing.

Soldiers, Family Members, retirees and Department of the Army Civilians interested in signing up for recreational scuba diving classes or the handicapped classes for wounded Warriors should call 767-9336 at Stewart or 315-2019 at Hunter. ## EFMP offers helping hand

Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield Army Community Services wants to educate Soldiers and Families about the Army's Exceptional Family Member Program.

The Army's Exceptional Family Member Program was established in 1979 as the Handicapped Dependent Program. In 1986, the name was changed to the EFMP and enrollment in the program became mandatory.

The EFMP is a mandatory enrollment program for any dependent of an active-duty Soldier who has been diagnosed with a medical and/or educational need. Enrolling in the EFMP is a way for a Soldier to identify to the Department of the Army that he/she has a Family Member with a special need.

Enrollment in the EFMP also guarantees that the Army will consider the special medical/educational need of the exceptional Family Member during the assignment process and will try to assign the Soldier to an area where the need of the Family can be met.

According to Mavis Crowell, EFMP manager for Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield, there are more than 2,500 Family Members enrolled in EFMP on the installation. Army Community Service's EFMP staff is available to assist Family Members in locating specific resources and services that they may need.

ACS offers an array of services that are available for Family Members enrolled in the EFMP. A monthly EFMP support group is held the last Wednesday of each month at ACS Family Readiness Center, building 87, from 6:30 to 7:30 p.m. The next meeting is Sept. 24. There will be a

pot luck (bring your favorite dish) for Family Members to meet and greet each other and the ACS and Winn Army Community Hospital EFMP staff.

Additionally, the EFMP sponsors bowling the first Monday of each month to Family Members who are enrolled in the program from 6 to 8 p.m. at Marne Lanes. Crowell also said that ACS, EFMP works closely with the local Special Olympics Council and coordinates and hosts the Spring and Winter Special Olympic Games at Fort Stewart.

Also available through ACS EFMP, is the EFMP Respite Care Program. Family Members enrolled in EFMP and who meet one of seven eligibility requirements certified by a medical provider can complete a Family needs assessment and receive up to 40 hours a month of respite care. Respite care is defined as a temporary rest or break for the caretaker of a special needs Family Member.

A medical doctor must certify that the Family Member falls into one of the several categories, including the need for little or no age appropriate self-help skills; severe continuous seizure activity; ambulation with neurological impairment that requires assistance with activities of daily living; tube feeding; tracheotomy with frequent suctioning; apnea monitoring during hours of sleep; and inability to control behavior with safety issues requiring constant supervision. The Respite Care Program has proven to be a success for many Soldiers and Families.

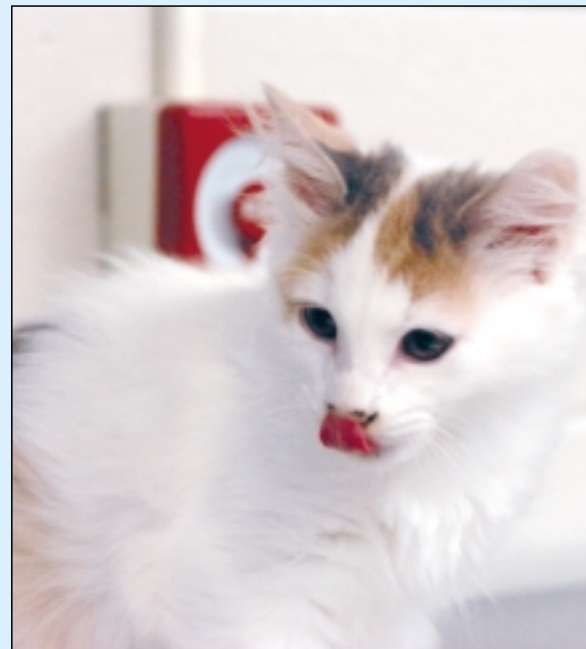

### Interactive DVD among new tools to prevent suicides

National Suicide Prevention Week, Sept. 7-13, will be an opportunity for the Army to roll out some new initiatives and training tools, said one of the Army's leading psychiatrists.

"Unfortunately, the numbers of suicides in the Army continue to go up," said Col. Elspeth C. Ritchie, director of the Army Medical Department's Strategic Communications and formerly psychiatry consultant to the Army's surgeon general. She said the Army had a high of 115 suicides last year.

Ritchie said the Army's recent push on suicide awareness has awakened Soldiers to the potential problem but added that many still don't know what to do about it. For instance, she said Soldiers might recognize depression over a romantic breakup as a risk factor for suicide but might not be sure how to approach the Soldier in need.

This fall a new interactive DVD will allow Soldiers to practice how they would aid potential suicide victims, Ritchie said. The DVD features realistic video vignettes about two Soldiers with problems.

The video, or "virtual experience immersive

learning simulation," also known as VEILS, follows the problems of the two Soldiers and their stories change based on input from the viewer.

If the viewer says the wrong thing and gets bad results, Ritchie said the DVD will allow the trainee to re-do the vignette until the outcome is more favorable.

The DVD was developed by Lincoln University in Missouri for the Army and Ritchie said thousands of them will be distributed to Soldiers this fall, probably by November.

Vignettes are also available on the Web page of the Army Center for Health Promotion and Preventive Medicine, Ritchie pointed out. The CHPPM training offers five printed vignettes, each asking at the bottom how the reader would respond and offering multiple-choice answers.

Also available on the CHPPM site are suicide prevention posters, with slogans such as "Never accept defeat" and "Never leave a fallen comrade."

The Web site also has a downloadable six-panel "Leader's Guide to Suicide Prevention. And it has the ACE Suicide Intervention Tipcard. ACE stands for "ask, care and escort" and those are the recommended steps for providing assistance to a Soldier at risk, Ritchie said. She said the Soldier should be escorted to a chaplain, a psychiatrist or another

care provider.

The Army is also boosting care providers in order to attack the suicide problem, Ritchie said.

"We've been trying very hard to hire more behavioral health specialists," Ritchie said.

The Army has hired 191 more providers this year at direct-care facilities such as Army medical centers, Ritchie said. And TRICARE has brought on more than 2,800 more mental-health providers, she said.

Telepsychiatry is another new treatment option being offered to Soldiers in some remote locations such as Alaska, Ritchie said. The teleconference option is being offered to Soldiers at the National Training Center in California's Mohave Desert, Ritchie said, and it's being offered to Guard and Reserve troops mobilizing at places like Camp Atterbury, Ill.

The Army will roll out a new Comprehensive Mental Health Strategy in early October, Ritchie said, at the annual meeting of the Association of the U.S. Army.

# Travel: Hunter Army Lodging a great bargain

Soldiers need not spend hundreds of dollars at a five-star hotel when passing through Savannah while on temporary duty. Instead, they can choose to stay at the Hunter Army Airfield Army Lodging, which recently earned the Army Lodging 2008 Lodging Operation of the Year award.

"It's an honor to even be nominated," said Connie Parks, lodging manager at Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield. "There are four categories: small, medium, large and super and we won in the small category."

The award was presented Aug. 26, at the Morale Welfare and Recreation conference in Louisville, Ky.

"It felt good to win," Parks said. "You never know who you're competing against. The staff worked really hard and I had hoped we'd win because they deserve it certainly."

In addition to earning bragging rights, the lodge employees are awarded with a pin to wear and each employee received a cash prize. The lodge itself was given a trophy and \$2,500 which has already been set aside for the construction of a trophy case that will also hold the lodge's Army Lodging 2005 Lodging Operation

of the Year award.

"To me, it's not about having the trophy; it's about what we did to get us to the top," said Marvin Johnson, assistant manager at the Hunter Army Lodge. "It's about taking care of Soldiers, veterans, Families - what we did every day, and the end result was the trophy. We didn't set out to win Army Lodging of the Year; we set out to take care of the Soldiers that come through."

Lodges are judged based on an exhaustive list of criteria, said Parks. An inspection of the facility was conducted by an inspector from Germany and an inspector from the Army Lodging Headquarters over the course of two days. With only a three-day notice, the lodge did not have time to make any major changes, said Parks.

"You have to be ready all the time," Parks said. "The inspection starts from the moment they called ahead for a reservation. There are 400 areas of inspection, and they check everything from paperwork to the rooms to the grounds, everything. There is a set of standards that all Army lodges adhere to - like corporate hotels. You can't fix anything in three days, so you have to be up to standard, and that's for the Soldiers and the Family Members."

A part of the standard is keeping prices affordable to

Soldiers. Johnson says one major difference between a commercial hotel and the Army Lodge is the focus on making the Soldiers a priority by keeping in mind possible financial constraints.

"We are here to accommodate the Soldiers and try to help them, said Johnson. "For young Soldiers, we can work out an arrangement to pay. We understand that with the situation the way it is with Iraq and Afghanistan, the Army moves them so quick, and they may need assistance, so that's what we try to do."

However, Johnson says simply keeping the price of the room low may not be enough help for some Soldiers. The continuously updated and renovated 38-room lodge has all the amenities of home in a hotel setting, said Johnson.

"The rooms are set up like apartments because some Soldiers stay for six months to a year," said Johnson. "Some Soldiers can't spend a lot of money eating out for all their meals, so when they stay here, they can go to the commissary and cook in their rooms."

After winning the award, the lodge is prohibited from entering the competition for two years but that does not mean the staff at the Army Lodge is ready to slack.

"We have 16 people on staff and the lodge is full all the time - every single day," said Parks. "We spent the last two years preparing, going over standards and making sure we're doing all we can do so we don't slip on standards."

Many improvements have been added to the Hunter Army Lodge, including high-speed Internet in the rooms, new furniture, and flat screen TVs. The customer comment cards are reviewed and improvements are made based of their information. They also communicate with other lodging properties for ideas.

"We talk to each other and see if what they've done and if we want to try something new, we'll see who else has done it and how it worked," said Parks. "We use all of the knowledge. We're all working for Soldiers so there's really no rivalry at all."

Parks was also given an award at the MWR conference for Lodging Manager of the Year, a peer-voted award.

"It was tough competition," said Parks. "There were 15 of us who submitted packets, or had a supervisor submit a packet. There are some really good managers out there. I was surprised I got it. Of course, I couldn't have done it without the staff. They make me look good. They're the ones in the rooms taking care of it, making it look good for our Soldiers."

Parks, who has worked as the manager of HunterArmy Lodge for six years, says she finds her satisfaction in working for Soldiers, which she said is the "best thing in the world to do."

"This is a Soldiers first and last impression of Hunter Army Airfield," said Parks. "Quality is important because they're doing great things, and we need to take care of them. They deserve it."
