Great finds abound at Great FMWR Yard Sale

Customers came in a steady stream and in large numbers, anxious to look through thousands of bargains on hundreds of tables at the Club Stewart and Hunter Credit Union parking lots and in housing areas of both posts, Oct. 24.

Response to the Great Family and Morale, Welfare and Recreation Yard Sale was enthusiastic and heavy, both on the



vendor side and the customer side, said Randy Walker, one of the FMWR staffers on hand to ensure the popular event went off smoothly at Stewart.

"We had about 100 sales in housing areas and about 120 tables set up here at the Club Stewart parking lot," he said. "The vendors were out here really early and so were the bargain hunters... I believe it is because of the economy."

A steady rain late in the morning caused some Stewart vendors to close up early or set up temporary tents to protect their sale items. The sale ran from 8 a.m. until 2 p.m.

At Hunter, the weather was ideal, except for a light rain shower during the last hour. More than 40 sellers set up in the Hunter Credit Union parking lot and a number conducted sales from their homes.

"Everyone was very appreciative to FMWR for holding this event, and they were happy to have the opportunity to make some extra cash and get rid of some items they no longer needed," said Eli Wilson, a member of the Hunter sale's FMWR staff. "The event was a suc-

cess. This was by far the best turnout since I've been at Hunter."

"We wanted to have a yard sale to raise money for our sorority scholarship fund," Sgt. 1st Class Lawson said. "The money we raise today will go toward a scholarship we will be giving away in 2010. We've had steady traffic all morning long."

Inappropriate boundaries lead to personal conflict

Physical boundaries help us determine who may touch us and under what circumstances. Mental boundaries give us the freedom to have our own thoughts and opinions. Emotional boundaries help us to deal with our own emotions and disengage from the harmful and manipulative emotions of others. Spiritual boundaries help us to distinguish God's will from our own while maintaining continuous respect for our Creator.

People who have constant conflict with authority figures may be experiencing transference. Transference causes an individual to exhibit behavior in the present that is a direct result of a confrontation with someone from

their past that was never resolved. Although the supervisor has no idea what the problem is, they are being attacked because they remind this individual of that particular person. Each encounter with this angered worker triggers a negative response and the supervisors remarks come across as being derogatory and distasteful.

There are those who report to work expecting their co-workers to give them the love, admiration and attention that they did not get at home. While it is true that the work place should be supportive, safe, and nurturing, the actions resulting from supportive co-workers should lead to increased productivity and performance instead of an opened door to immorality, fantasy, touching and ill-advised emotional pleasure.

There are those who for some reason

or another take their jobs home. They come to work to discuss all of their personal problems, and when they get home, they spend valuable Family time solving work-related issues. This can lead to going out on the town with co-workers. There are those people who come to work and borrow money from co-workers to alleviate their financial difficulties at home. I remember one fellow who talked to his co-worker so much about his wife's problems that when the co-worker finally met her, he fell in love with the woman, and began an extramarital affair. I am also reminded of a squad leader who was secretly borrowing money from two of his specialists in order to pay his bills. He was eventually put out of the Army.

What a wakeup call for inappropriate boundaries.
