Bladerunners rail B.C. United 5-1

Bladerunners Andrew Brock and Kevin Tulloch led B Company, 123rd Signal Battalion to a 5-1 decision over a B.C. United team made up of players from both 92nd Chemical Co. and B Co., 703rd Main Support Battalion May 19 at the 123rd Sig. Bn. soccer fields.

Brock scored three goals and Tulloch added two using their breakaway speed to extend the Blade Runners record to 3-1, while B.C. United fell to 1-3.

"We were hoping that the loss last week would wake us up," Brock said.

Both teams played hard at the start of the game, with both teams getting shots on goal. Brock scored first giving the Bladerunners a 1-0 lead.

Shortly afterwards, Tulloch broke away from a B.C. United defender to score.

After another Brock goal, extending the score to 3-0, B.C. United broke the shut out with a goal by Jeremiah Johnson which went over the head of Bladerunner goalie Tracy Gillespie. This was the only score Gillespie would allow during the

game.

The score was 3-1 at halftime, and both teams prepared themselves for second half.

"We need to keep the ball low, keep it down field and just make sure we communicate," said Tommy Moser, Bladerunner's team captain.

The second half began with B.C. United pushing the ball down field, but shots by Edwin Lorenzo and Jarman couldn't find the net.

The Bladerunners continued to score after a breakaway goal by Tulloch increasing the lead to 4-1.

After a couple late shots by B.C. United, Brock put the nail in the coffin with his 3rd goal of the day.

"It was a team effort today," Moser said. "The team passed the ball well to set up Tulloch and Brock."

B.C. United needed to win to keep their playoff hopes alive.

This loss hurts our playoff chances, said Shawn McCurdy, B.C. United team captain.

"We played together last year, but we need to work better as a team."

Army partners with cowboys

LAS VEGAS — The U.S. Army added five riders to its professional rodeo team May 15.

The original team, announced April 17 with partner Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association, consisted of three bull riders.

The Army is now sponsoring seven cowboys and a cowgirl to represent the Army in hundreds of rodeos throughout the United States and Canada.

The partnership with PRCA will allow the Army to reach out to a segment of Americans "that we were certain we were missing," said Maj. Gen. Michael D. Rochelle, commander of U.S. Army Recruiting Command.

The partnership, which will run

through the end of this year with an option to renew for 2005 is "part of the overall Army team," which includes partnerships with NASCAR, Professional Bull Riding and the Arena Football League among others. But, said Rochelle, "What we are doing is, more than anything, in support of" the troops overseas.

Steven J. Hatchell, commissioner of the PRCA, expects the partnership to be a boon to his organization as well as to the Army because, he said, traditional rodeo sponsors like alcohol and tobacco companies made televising the events problematic. "We are a television society and this helps us with television in a significant way," Hatchell said.

Army pitcher selected by NASA

Shane Kimbrough realizes dream

West Point, N.Y. — First, former Black Knight hurler Maj. Gen. Ray Odierno served as commander of the infantry division that was responsible for capturing Saddam Hussein in Iraq in December; then freshman left-hander Nick Hill was selected Patriot League pitcher of the year. Shane Kimbrough, a 1989 graduate of the U.S. Military Academy, became the latest member of the Army pitching fraternity to experience a milestone event when he was named one of 11 new astronaut candidates on May 6 during a Space Day celebration at the National Air and Space Museum's Steven F. Udvar-Hazy Center in Chantilly, Va.

The class of 2004 will be the first focused from the very beginning on realizing the new Vision for Space Exploration. It marks the first class of astronaut trainees since 2000.

A three-time letter-winner and former team co-captain, Kimbrough ranks among Army's career leaders in saves. The Texas native earned a bachelor's degree in Aerospace Engineering from West Point and a master's degree in Operations Research from Georgia Institute of Technology.

Kimbrough is a veteran of Desert Storm, where he served as the platoon leader of an Apache attack helicopter company. He currently works for NASA in Houston as a flight simulation engineer. Officials stated he would be trained as a mission specialist for the space shuttle. NASA Administrator Sean O'Keefe called members of the new astronaut class, "our next generation of explorers, who'll help blaze a galactic trail though the solar system."

The class includes pilots, mission specialists and three new mission specialist-educator astronauts, teachers who will help ensure there is always a next generation

primed to explore. The candidates will report to NASA's Johnson Space Center this summer. Once settled in Houston, they will begin an intensive training and evaluation period of up to two years, part of which requires completion of military water survival and scuba qualification. Candidates will also undergo land survival training, jet ground and flight training, shuttle orbiter systems training, space station systems training, science and engineering briefings and orientation tours at all NASA centers, including the Kennedy Space Center and Marshall Space Flight Center.

The candidates are the first announced by NASA under President Bush's new space initiative. Earlier this year, the president committed the U.S. to long-term human and robotic programs to explore the solar system, starting with a return to the moon as well as future exploration of Mars.

changed the way they were hitting. "Before tonight, we were always out there trying to hit home runs," he said. "We stayed aggressive at the plate, hit the ball hard and let the game play out."

Hatchell said that with the Army partnership the PRCA is planning an expansion that will lead to increased television exposure similar to that of the Professional Golf Association. Already, he said, rodeo is seventh overall in attendance for all sports and saw an increase in attendance of four percent last year — the highest of any sport.

An estimated 23 million people attended the PRCA's roughly 700 sanctioned rodeos last year. The PRCA's premier events appear on CBS, ESPN, ESPN2 and Outdoor Life Network.

The announcement of the partnership came against the backdrop of one of pro-

fessional rodeo's biggest competitions, the Pace Picante ProRodeo Chute-out at the Orleans Arena in Las Vegas, where \$500,000 in prize money was up for grabs. Three of the Army's newly-sponsored cowboys competed in the three-day event that ended March 15.

All three of the Army's competitors made it to the semifinal round, but only one, steer wrestler Luke Branquinho, made it to the final round of the rodeo. The PRCA has renamed the final round of its rodeos the U.S. Army Championship Round for all future rodeo events as long as the Army partnership lasts. Branquinho won in the final round and took home

more than \$20,000 in prize money. The Army's other rodeo competitors are:

Trevor Brazile, who competes in tie-down roping, steer roping and team roping, won back-to-back all-around world titles in 2002 and 2003 at the Wrangler National Finals Rodeo. He was the first cowboy ever to qualify for the Wrangler NFR in four events.

Fred Whitfield has a total of seven world titles — six in tie-down roping and one all-around. He will be inducted into the Pro Rodeo Hall of Fame in August.

Andy Bolich, a bareback rider, has won titles in Kalispell, Mont., and Omak, Wash.

Wayne Folmer, a team roper, is a three-time Wrangler NFR qualifier and was fourth in the world in 2003.

Cody DeMoss, a saddle bronc rider, qualified for his first Wrangler NFR and was 12th in the world in 2003. He is in second place this year and has a shot at winning the saddle bronc title.

Brittany Pozzi, a barrel racer, became the first rookie to qualify for the Wrangler NFR at the top of the standings in 2003. She finished seventh overall in her first PRCA season.

Zack Oakes, a bull rider, won RodeoHouston and the PRCA's Xtreme Bulls in Clovis, N.M. earlier this year.


