ters chanted, only to be brought to a halt by Bulldawg Christopher Hargrove, who held up the opposing player's flag.

"You ain't goin' nowhere, baby," he announced.

Receiver Tim "Mick" Johnson put D-Block ahead to 13-7 with a touchdown in the second quarter, right before halftime.

"D-Block is the best," said quarterback Seth Rovelstad. "The team's doing well and I'm happy to be a part of them."

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Nemechek's Army team wins in Kansas

KANSAS CITY, Kan. — A jubilant Joe Nemechek called it a dream weekend after he won the NASCAR Nextel Cup race Oct. 10 at Kansas Speedway.

The U.S. Army driver not only captured his fourth career Cup win, he also took the pole for the 400-mile event and won Saturday's Busch Series race in his NEMECK Motorsports entry.

Nemechek's Kansas City sweep concluded with a thrilling finish as he edged a hard-charging Ricky Rudd to the checkered flag by 0.081 seconds.

"There at the end (last lap) I was trying to save gas and here comes Ricky Rudd out of nowhere," said Nemechek, who led the final 37 laps of the 267-lap race. "I was like, 'Holy Moley.' I had to get back on it. He got beside me one time, but I wasn't going to let it happen."

And he didn't. Nemechek's tenacity and driving skills prevailed as his No. 01 U.S.

Army/MB2 Chevrolet took that joyous ride to Victory Lane.

"Incredible!" shouted Nemechek. "This is something that every racer dreams of — winning both races (Cup and Busch) and getting the Bud Pole. It's a tribute to this entire U.S. Army/USG team. It's like a group of people working together for a common goal to have success with the same virtues that are part of the Army."

"I am so proud to represent the Army — I have the best sponsor in the garage. I want to thank all of the troops in the states and overseas. I hope we made them proud. I've always said that they (Soldiers) deserve to have their car in Victory Lane. Now we did it. This is really a cool experience for me to represent the Army."

It was a race in which military-sponsored cars took the top three places as Rudd's Air Force team came in second and Greg Biffle in the National Guard's car

Army finishes second in Armed Forces golf

FORT CARSON, Colo. — The Army finished second in the 2004 Armed Forces Golf Championships at Fort Carson, Colo., Sept. 20 to Sept. 24, behind the Air Force.

Thirty-six of the best golfers from the Army, Air Force, Navy and Marine Corps — six men and three women from each service — converged on Fort Carson Golf Club for the four-day team and individual tournament. Amidst some precarious winter-like

weather during the first two days of the competition, scores ranged from near par to well over par. The final two days of the tournament saw a return to more seasonable weather and a tougher course.

Air Force Capt. Jeff Scohy of Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, Ohio, claimed the overall men's title with a 283 total. Air Force 2nd Lt. Karin Tjelmeland of Lajes Air Base, Azore Islands, finished first for the women with a score

of 341.

Air Force made it a clean sweep by taking the team title with a score of 2,793, followed by Army (2,842), Navy (3,000) and Marine Corps (3,096).

Despite the unseasonably cold weather, many of the golfers said the course held up well and was great to play.

"It's a real nice golf course," said Army Sgt. Patrick Hawthorne of Fort Meade, Md. "It was 43 degrees and raining (the first

day), but this tournament is very good."

Hawthorne was among the final threesome in the last day of competition and finished in a three-way tie for third. He was awarded fifth place after losing on the second hole of a playoff.

"There are a lot of good players in the military, no matter what service you're in," Hawthorne said.

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When play resumed, the Bulldawgs regained their lead, quickly scoring two touchdowns and overtaking D-Block 19-13.

However, the lead was only a temporary one, as D-Block's Terence Davenport ran the ball in to tie the score up once again with two minutes left in play.

With seconds on the clock and a one-point lead, D-Block claimed their victory.

"We're undefeated once again," said Clifton "Da Truth" Smith, receiver, of his team's now 5-0 record. "You won't see nobody beating us this year."

"We play with heart," said Travis "Dago" Delmastro, D-Block defensive lineman.

The Bulldawgs response to the loss was a congenial one.

"It was a good game, very challenging," Hargrove said. "Both teams showed a lot of respect ... it was a very competitive game."

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finished third.

The pivotal point of the race came when Nemechek's crew chief Ryan Pemberton made a calculated call by not electing to take a splash of fuel on Lap 209. While the leaders pitted to top off their fuel tanks, Nemechek moved from 12th to 4th and put himself in contention - but with the possibility of running out of gas if the remainder of the race stayed green.

"We were right on the edge to make it the rest of the way," said

Pemberton. "We told Joe to do the best he can to save fuel - and he did. But a couple cautions came out later and that helped us. It was a tough decision, but I knew I had a driver who could do it. This was really a team effort. Not only did the over-the-wall guys do a super job on pits stops, but everyone on this team hit their marks. It was truly an Army of One victory."

With the fuel concern and the last lap duel with Rudd, Nemechek was

asked in post-race interviews if he felt like he almost let this win get away.

"Well, there are a lot of would have's, could have's and should have's," explained Nemechek. "But I'm sitting here in the media center with the big trophy. Nobody can take that away from me."

And nobody did as the Banquet 400 trophy was safely packed in the team's transporter for the ride home to the MB2 Motorsports shop in Concord, N.C.

GOLF

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Entering the final day of play, Scohy held a two-stroke lead over Air Force teammate Tech Sgt. Brian Billingsly of Robbins Air Force Base, Ga. He finished with a three-stroke victory over Billingsly and was five strokes ahead of third-place finisher Army Sgt. Chris Douglas of Fort Bragg, N.C.

Douglas defeated Navy's Billy Hurley in a marathon eight-hole playoff. Each player had an opportunity to win the playoff, only to either miss a putt or watch his counterpart sink a long putt. Douglas finally finished the playoff when he sank a 13-foot putt on the 18th green.

Tjelmeland finished one stroke ahead of Army Capt. Shelley Sanders of Aberdeen Proving Ground, Md., and three strokes ahead of Air Force's Tammy Garcia of Wright-Patterson Air Force Base.

Lt. Col. Mark Johnson (300), Maj. Michael Armstrong (302), Capt. Nick Schommer (303) and Chief Warrant Officer Samuel Solomon (304) rounded out the

Army men's team.

Sgt. Stephanie Mann (356) and Capt. Sunny Mitchell (359) completed the Army women's contingent.

"The first few days were kind of rough," said Bill Fumai, general manager of Fort Carson Golf Course. "We let them improve their lie and lift, clean and play their golf balls. [The third day] we tucked the pins a little bit and made the course a little tougher. [The final day] we made the course a little more lenient."

Army led the overall competition after the first day with a team score of 731 with Air Force close behind at 734. Navy was third at 781 strokes and the Marines Corps was last with 808.

After day two, Air Force led with a score of 1,397, followed by Army (1,415), Navy (1,499) and the Marines (1,544).

Air Force took a commanding lead on day three, surging 41 ahead with a score of 2,095. Army was second with 2,135, followed by Navy with 2,259 and the Marine Corps with 2,314.
